

Engage your pupils during Refugee Week (18–24 June)

Did you know? In 2017:

- there were 65.6 million displaced people worldwide, including 22.5 million refugees
- over half of the world's refugees came from three countries: Syria (5.5 million); Afghanistan (2.5 million) and South Sudan (1.4 million)
- Turkey (2.9 million), Pakistan (1.4 million) and Lebanon (1.0 million) hosted the most refugees
- Europe hosted 17% of refugees; Africa hosted 30%¹.

Monday 18 June is World Refugee Day, the start of **Refugee Week 2018**. The Global Learning Programme (GLP) in England offers resources to help your school celebrate the contribution that refugees make to our country, and encourage pupils to explore the complex issues around migration and interdependence more generally.

This year's theme celebrates the contributions, creativity and resilience of refugees and invites you to take part in one or more of '20 simple acts' (2018 is the 20th anniversary of Refugee Week).
